SYNOPSIS:

This bill makes supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023, from the Education Trust Fund to various agencies and entities in a total amount of \$2,787,667,309.

A BILL
TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT

To make supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023, from the Education Trust Fund to various agencies and entities in a total amount of \$2,787,667,309.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. In addition to all other appropriations heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a total of \$2,787,667,309 from the Education Trust Fund to the following agencies and entities for the purposes specified below for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023:

- (1) To the Department of Revenue - Refundable Tax Credit Fund for income tax rebates, \$550,000,000, in accordance with HB175/SB86 of the 2023 Regular Session.
- (2) To Debt Service, to satisfy the remaining debt



29 service obligation on PSCA Bonds, Series 2012-B and 2013-C,
30 \$18,552,126.

31 (3) To the Department of Finance, Division of Risk
32 Management, for the State Insurance Fund, \$10,000,000.

33 (4) To the State Board of Education - Local Boards of
34 Education, \$64,134,584. Of this amount, \$23,673,683 shall be
35 used for the Foundation Program Salary Matrix; \$20,000,000
36 shall be distributed to systems that demonstrate the highest
37 need for fleet renewal, taking into consideration the age and
38 mileage of eligible buses and the number of eligible buses that
39 run morning and afternoon routes, as recommended by the State
40 Superintendent of Education and approved by the Governor; and
41 \$20,460,901 shall be used to pre-fund one-half of the state
42 cost of student materials for the 2023-2024 school year to
43 allow the funds to be utilized by teachers when the school year
44 begins.

45 (5) To the State Department of Education for one-time
46 expenses, \$480,037,503. Of this amount, \$8,000,000 shall be
47 used for the American Village, of which, \$7,000,000 shall be
48 used for one-time capital expenditures for Independence Hall,
49 and \$1,000,000 shall be used for the Troy University Civics
50 Education Partnership. Of this amount, \$360,000,000 shall be
51 used as needed by school systems to help offset inflationary
52 increases in capital project and equipment costs initiated with
53 2020 PSCA bond funds, for school resource officers, insurance,
54 or other uses allowed with the Advancement and Technology Fund
55 pursuant to Section 29-9-4, Code of Alabama 1975, and
56 distributed on a pro rata basis based upon each system's



57 allocation in the 2020 PSCA bond issue, except where otherwise
58 provided in this act; \$10,000,000 shall be distributed to the
59 several existing Charter Schools on a per pupil basis;
60 \$10,000,000 shall be used for College and Career Readiness
61 grants; \$24,000,000 shall be used for summer math camps;
62 \$40,000,000 shall be used for school safety grants; \$5,000,000
63 shall be used for Junior Achievement of Alabama located in
64 Birmingham, all of which shall be expended for capital needs,
65 not to exceed 50% of the capital budget; \$200,000 shall be used
66 for one-time expenses for the Alabama Holocaust Commission;
67 \$2,237,503 shall be used for Ed Farm; \$200,000 shall be used
68 for the McWane Center STEM education programs; \$1,000,000 shall
69 be used for the Children Trust Fund for one-time software
70 expenses; \$1,750,000 shall be used for Selma elementary schools
71 tornado reconstruction expenses; \$250,000 shall be used for the
72 Alabama Symphony Orchestra; \$100,000 shall be used for Mobile
73 County Schools cerebral palsy services; \$300,000 shall be used
74 for Woolley Institute for Spoken Language Education for
75 children's hearing services; and \$17,000,000 shall be used for
76 the Saban Discovery Center. The Saban Discovery Center will be
77 an innovative hub for local and regional school districts to
78 educate and inspire children to enter STEAM (science,
79 technology, engineering, arts and design, mathematics) related
80 fields by providing hands on immersive and interactive
81 activities in the state-of-the-art facility. As a condition of
82 receiving state funding the Center shall: provide educators
83 with unique opportunities for professional development related
84 to lessons designed by the Center and shared with schools;



85 provide a discount of 50% on full-price tickets to Alabama
86 school-aged children. The State Department of Education will
87 work with the Saban Center to ensure the development of
88 appropriate lesson plans, resources, visits, and professional
89 development for teachers. The Department may also include other
90 partners such as regional in-service centers. The Saban Center
91 will also play an important role with workforce development
92 through the Center's STEAM Academy which will have the capacity
93 to play an instrumental role in connecting industry leaders
94 with a pipeline of skilled employees.

95 (6) To the Alabama Fire Fighters Personnel Standards and
96 Education Commission/Alabama Fire College for one-time expenses
97 related to a training module to help mitigate electric vehicle
98 fires, \$200,000.

99 (7) To the Retirement Systems of Alabama for one-time
100 Covid-related expenditures for PEEHIP, \$59,179,185.

101 (8) To the Department of Commerce for one-time expenses,
102 \$108,500,000. Of this amount, \$18,000,000 shall be used for the
103 "Earth" Workforce and Innovation Center for rural workforce
104 preparation and innovation/economic development center;
105 \$12,000,000 shall be directed to the Lauderdale County
106 Commission for a hydroelectric workforce training center upon
107 demonstrating a minimum of ten percent (10%) private or other
108 funds for the cost of the project; \$30,000,000 shall be used
109 for an AIDT electric vehicle workforce training center; and
110 \$8,500,000 shall be used for the Challenger Learning Center. As
111 a condition of receiving state funding the Center must:
112 demonstrate a minimum of ten percent (10%) private or other



113 funds for the cost of the project; shall provide a discount of
114 50% on full-price tickets to Alabama school-aged children; and
115 shall not make a request for additional state funding for 10
116 years after the receipt of the initial state funding. In
117 addition, \$40,000,000 shall be expended to create and fund the
118 Alabama Site Development Fund. The fund shall be managed and
119 controlled by the State Industrial Development Authority and
120 expended to provide grants for the assessment of and subsequent
121 development of sites.

122 (9) To the Alabama Innovation Fund for one-time
123 expenses, \$51,000,000. Of this amount, \$20,000,000 shall be
124 used for the Agricultural Center of Innovation upon
125 demonstrating a minimum of ten percent (10%) private or other
126 funds for the cost of the project; \$8,000,000 shall be used for
127 the Hudson Alpha Institute for Biotechnology's campus expansion
128 which will consist of greenhouses and learning labs for the
129 Hudson Alpha Center for Plant Science and Sustainable
130 Agriculture and the Global Headquarters of Discovery Life
131 Sciences; \$8,000,000 shall be used for the Southern Research
132 Institute Cystic Fibrosis Foundation Partnership; and
133 \$15,000,000 shall be used for improvements to outdoor
134 recreation areas as recommended by the Innovate Alabama Outdoor
135 Recreation Advisory Council in consultation with the Department
136 of Conservation and Natural Resources and approved by Innovate
137 Alabama. Of the amount for outdoor recreational areas, \$850,000
138 shall be used for a study on establishing a statewide trails
139 network by Jacksonville State University.

140 (10) To the Alabama School of Mathematics and Science



141 for one-time capital projects and deferred maintenance expenses
142 to facilities and property used by the school, \$6,000,000. The
143 school shall be ineligible for inflationary increases from the
144 Department of Education pursuant to subdivision (5) above.

145 (11) To the Alabama School of Fine Arts for one-time
146 capital projects and deferred maintenance expenses to
147 facilities and property used by the school, \$6,000,000. The
148 school shall be ineligible for inflationary increases from the
149 Department of Education pursuant to subdivision (5) above.

150 (12) To the Alabama School of Cyber Technology and
151 Engineering for one-time capital projects and deferred
152 maintenance expenses to facilities and property used by the
153 school, \$6,000,000. The school shall be ineligible for
154 inflationary increases from the Department of Education
155 pursuant to subdivision (5).

156 (13) To the Alabama Commission on Higher Education,
157 \$46,660,831. Of this amount, \$7,000,000 shall be transferred to
158 Tuskegee University without reduction for administrative
159 expenses for one-time expenses for deferred maintenance,
160 renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with
161 ongoing capital projects; \$1,000,000 shall be used for the
162 Forest Workforce Training Center; \$100,000 shall be used for
163 the Talent Retention Initiative Project; \$3,400,000 shall be
164 used for National Guard Educational Scholarships; \$5,000,000
165 shall be used for one-time capital expenses for the USS Alabama
166 Battleship; \$15,000,000 shall be used for Outcomes-Based
167 Funding for 4-year colleges and universities, and other upper
168 division institutions based on the February 2021 report from



169 the Alabama Workgroup on Outcomes-Based Funding; \$270,000 shall
170 be used for the Best and Brightest STEM Pilot Program pursuant
171 to the provisions of Act 2020-204; \$5,000,000 shall be used for
172 the Deferred Maintenance Program for HBCU colleges and
173 universities; \$4,500,000 shall be used for ReEngage, part of
174 the All in Alabama campaign; \$5,000,000 shall be used for the
175 Birmingham Zoo - Alabama Veterinary Teaching Hospital; and
176 \$390,831 shall be used for the Southern Museum of Flight.

177 (14) To the Department of Early Childhood Education for
178 classrooms in areas with waiting lists, \$4,134,315.

179 (15) To the Department of Rehabilitation Services,
180 \$2,300,000. Of this amount, \$300,000 shall be used for cerebral
181 palsy services, and \$2,000,000 shall be used for federal
182 matching funds.

183 (16) To Alabama A&M University for one-time expenses for
184 deferred maintenance, campus security, renovation of existing
185 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
186 projects, \$20,969,937.

187 (17) To Alabama State University for one-time expenses
188 for deferred maintenance, campus security, renovation of
189 existing, facilities, or expenses associated with any capital
190 projects, \$13,399,461.

191 (18) To the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa for
192 one-time expenses, \$66,173,691. Of this amount, \$46,000,000
193 shall be used for the Center for High Performance Computing;
194 \$8,000,000 shall be used for the Saban Center; and \$12,173,691
195 shall be used for the National Training Center for Electric
196 Vehicle Infrastructure and Technology.



197 (19) To the University of Alabama at Birmingham for
198 one-time expenses, \$66,173,691. Of this amount, \$50,000,000
199 shall be used for significant expansion of the University's
200 Hospital Emergency Department and \$16,173,691 shall be used for
201 deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or
202 expenses associated with ongoing capital projects.

203 (20) To the University of Alabama at Huntsville,
204 \$29,287,652. Of this amount, \$19,287,652 shall be used for
205 one-time expenses for an Education and Advanced Training
206 Complex to effectively fill highly technical jobs in
207 engineering, cybersecurity, math, and science education; and
208 \$10,000,000 shall be used for the National Cyber Security
209 Center for Excellence.

210 (21) To Athens State University for one-time expenses,
211 \$7,358,853. Of this amount, \$1,000,000 shall be used for the
212 Hightower-Nazaretian House; \$4,000,000 shall be used for Brown
213 Hall; and \$2,358,853 shall be used for deferred maintenance,
214 renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with
215 ongoing capital projects.

216 (22) To Auburn University for one-time expenses,
217 \$66,173,691. Of this amount, \$20,000,000 shall be used for the
218 Brown-Kopel Lab build out/completion; \$37,998,691 shall be used
219 for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or
220 expenses associated with ongoing capital projects; \$175,000
221 shall be used for the EAGLES program; \$5,000,000 shall be used
222 for the McCrary Institute; and \$3,000,000 shall be used for
223 the Applied Research Institute to be used for the SAFEnet Pilot
224 Program.



225 (23) To Auburn University at Montgomery for one-time
226 expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing
227 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
228 projects, \$11,208,364.

229 (24) To Jacksonville State University for one-time
230 expenses, \$18,227,654. Of this amount, \$3,000,000 shall be used
231 for campus and pedestrian safety; \$6,446,640 shall be used to
232 pay unreimbursed insurance claims to the Education Trust Fund
233 Budget Stabilization Fund pursuant to Section 29-9-5(b) of the
234 Code of Alabama 1975, as amended by Act 2018-544; \$500,000
235 shall be used for Painted Rock Research Studies; and \$8,281,014
236 shall be used for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing
237 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
238 projects.

239 (25) To the University of Montevallo for one-time
240 expenses, \$6,541,737. Of this amount, \$3,500,000 shall be used
241 to replace underground wiring, and \$3,041,737 shall be used for
242 deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or
243 expenses associated with ongoing capital projects.

244 (26) To the University of North Alabama for one-time
245 expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing
246 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
247 projects, \$17,670,803.

248 (27) To the University of South Alabama for one-time
249 expenses, \$39,173,054. Of this amount, \$7,000,000 shall be used
250 for equipment and renovation needs of the engineering and
251 science labs of the College of Engineering; \$1,000,000 for
252 health simulation equipment; \$1,400,000 for two ADA compliant



253 motorcoaches; \$23,785,749 shall be used for deferred
254 maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or expenses
255 associated with ongoing capital projects; and \$5,987,305 shall
256 be used for the renovation and equipment needs of the JMB
257 classroom and rehearsal complex.

258 (28) To Troy University for one-time expenses,
259 \$33,546,233. Of this amount, \$15,000,000 shall be used for
260 completion of the nursing building and the Center for Materials
261 and Manufacturing Sciences building, and \$18,546,233 shall be
262 used for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing
263 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
264 projects.

265 (29) To the University of West Alabama for one-time
266 expenses, \$11,729,348. Of this amount, \$598,312 shall be used
267 for the concurrent 4-year ASN-BSN Program Option; \$335,700
268 shall be used for the Respiratory Therapy Program; \$339,900
269 shall be used for a new student recreation and fitness center;
270 \$929,565 shall be used for the Cahaba Biodiversity Center
271 Facilities Renovation; \$75,000 shall be used for one-time
272 technology needs of Selma University; \$700,000 shall be used
273 for the Black Belt Scholars Program providing middle and high
274 school student STEM, reading, coding, and robotics camps;
275 \$50,000 shall be used for the Black Belt Scholars Program -
276 Stillman College providing middle and high school student STEM,
277 reading, coding, and robotics camps in Tuscaloosa; and
278 \$8,700,871 shall be used for deferred maintenance, renovation
279 of existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing
280 capital projects.



281 (30) To the Alabama Community College System for
282 one-time expenses, \$485,350,000.

283 a. Of the above amount, \$103,000,000 shall be used for
284 the construction and/or equipping of facilities for inmate
285 education in state prison facilities. Of this amount,
286 \$100,000,000 shall be used to fund the construction and/or
287 equipping of educational facilities for inmate education,
288 programming and/or vocational education pursuant to the prison
289 modernization plan adopted by the Legislature in Act 2021-546,
290 codified at Section 14-2-1 et seq., Code of Alabama 1975.
291 Expenditure of these funds is conditioned on the approval of
292 the majority of the ACCS Board. In addition, \$3,000,000 shall
293 be used for an educational and programming building at the
294 Limestone Correctional facility.

295 b. \$30,000,000 shall be used for career tech facilities
296 and equipment upgrades.

297 c. \$5,000,000 shall be used for deferred maintenance,
298 renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with
299 ongoing capital projects.

300 d. \$1,000,000 shall be used for the Innovation Center -
301 Dunn University.

302 e. \$315,350,000 shall be used for expenses associated
303 with the following projects:

304 1. \$19,000,000 for Beville State Community College. Of
305 this amount, \$3,500,000 shall be used for facility renovations
306 and equipment at the Sumiton campus; \$15,000,000 shall be used
307 for the Workforce Sustainability Training Center and other
308 facility renovations at the Sumiton and Jasper campuses; and



309 \$500,000 shall be used for other facility renovations at the
310 Jasper campus.

311 2. \$21,000,000 for Bishop State Community College. Of
312 this amount, \$7,500,000 shall be used for aviation
313 infrastructure and \$1,000,000 shall be used for a project with
314 the Mobile Area Education Foundation.

315 3. \$20,000,000 for Coastal Alabama Community College. Of
316 this amount, \$7,500,000 shall be used for aviation
317 infrastructure.

318 4. \$20,000,000 for Calhoun Community College. Of this
319 amount, \$3,500,000 shall be used for digital design and
320 computer graphics/cyber workforce building renovations;
321 \$9,500,000 shall be used for the Arts Academy; and \$7,000,000
322 shall be used for the Workforce Training Center expansion
323 project.

324 5. \$10,000,000 for Central Alabama Community College for
325 renovations at the Alexander City and Childersburg campuses.

326 6. \$10,000,000 for Chattahoochee Valley Community
327 College to complete renovations of the Adams Administration and
328 Industry Training Center buildings.

329 7. \$12,000,000 for Drake State and Technical College's
330 Workforce Training Center.

331 8. \$15,000,000 for Enterprise State Community College's
332 Performing Arts Center and Workforce Training Center.

333 9. \$12,000,000 for Gadsden State Community College's
334 Advanced Manufacturing and Workforce Skills Training Center.

335 10. \$17,000,000 for Jefferson State Community College.
336 Of this amount, \$7,000,000 shall be used for the Trussville



337 Community Learning Center and \$10,000,000 shall be used for
338 workforce and renovation projects at the Jefferson campus.

339 11. \$10,000,000 for Lurleen B. Wallace for building
340 renovations at the Andalusia and Opp campuses.

341 12. \$10,000,000 for Lawson State Community College for
342 improvements at the Birmingham and Bessemer campuses.

343 13. \$7,500,000 for Marion Military Institute. Of this
344 amount, \$5,500,000 shall be used for renovations to student
345 dorms and \$2,000,000 for the Craig Field Flight Program.

346 14. \$15,000,000 for Northeast Alabama Community College.
347 Of this amount, \$8,000,000 shall be used for the Workforce
348 Training Center and \$7,000,000 shall be used for the
349 construction of a softball field complex.

350 15. \$20,000,000 for Northwest Shoals Community College.
351 Of this amount, \$17,000,000 shall be used for renovations to
352 the Phil Campbell campus; and \$3,000,000 shall be used for the
353 Lauderdale County Workforce Training Center.

354 16. \$10,000,000 for Reid State Technical College for
355 campus renovations and modernization.

356 17. \$12,000,000 for Shelton State Community College for
357 renovations and workforce modernization to the Martin and Fredd
358 campuses and renovations to the softball complex.

359 18. \$10,000,000 for Snead State Community College for
360 the purchase of the Albertville Aviation Center and necessary
361 equipment, renovations to the Technology building, and
362 inflationary cost increases for the Workforce Training Center.

363 19. \$10,000,000 for Southern Union State Community
364 College for the Auburn Aviation Center and renovations to the



365 Opelika and Valley campuses.

366 20. \$15,000,000 for Trenholm State Community College for
367 renovations to the Executive Park campus.

368 21. \$10,000,000 for Wallace Community College-Dothan's
369 Workforce Training Center.

370 22. \$15,850,000 for Wallace State Community
371 College-Hanceville. Of this amount, \$15,000,000 shall be used
372 for a new STEM Gateway Education Facility, and \$850,00 shall be
373 used for historic outdoor theater renovations in Winston
374 County.

375 23. \$4,000,000 for Wallace State Community
376 College-Oneonta for the Blount County multi-purpose complex.

377 24. \$10,000,000 for Wallace Community College-Selma for
378 inflationary cost increases to the Workforce Center in
379 Demopolis and renovations to the Selma campus.

380 f. \$31,000,000 shall be used to establish the Alabama
381 Centers for Rural Healthcare Opportunities, a collaboration
382 between the community colleges, rural healthcare employers, and
383 communities throughout the state designed to address dual
384 enrollment healthcare pathways and meet rural healthcare
385 employer needs for skilled labor. The first center shall be
386 located in Demopolis and be a collaboration between Wallace
387 State Community College-Selma and the counties of Dallas,
388 Green, Hale, Perry, Marengo, Sumter, and Wilcox. A full list of

390 counties served follows:

430 existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing
431 capital projects, \$7,000,000.

432 (32) To the Alabama Space Science Exhibit Commission,
433 \$5,750,000. Of this amount, \$5,000,000 shall be used for
434 one-time expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of
435 existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing
436 capital projects and \$750,000 shall be used for the Minority
437 Student Space Camp.

438 (33) To the Lieutenant Governor for the K-12 Capital
439 Grant Program established by SB269 of the 2023 Regular Session
440 and used to provide grants to eligible school systems to assist
441 with capital project, deferred maintenance, or technology
442 needs, \$104,000,000.

443 (34) To the Educational Television Commission for
444 one-time capital expenses related to establishing a tower in
445 west Alabama, \$2,500,000.

446 (35) To the Executive Commission on Community Services
447 Grants to be distributed pursuant to Section 29-2-123, Code of
448 Alabama 1975, \$23,009,596.

449 (36) To the Treasurer for the Distressed Higher
450 Education Schools loan program established by HB431 or SB278 of

469 one-time support for museum upgrades and/or property purchases,
470 \$5,000,000.

471 (41) To the Legislative Services Agency to contract with
472 an out-of state entity to conduct a feasibility study regarding
473 the establishment of a residency program for the fields of
474 healthcare or healthcare services to meet the needs of the
475 rural areas of the state, including the feasibility of a sight
476 in the Black Belt, \$750,000. The Agency shall file a report
477 with the Governor and the Chairs of the Senate Committee on
