9 ALABAMA.

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11 WHEREAS, Girl Scout Troop 1912, named for the year
12 that the Girl Scouts was founded, is a bipartisan delegation
13 of women and men of the Alabama House of Representatives and
14 the Alabama Senate established by the Girl Scouts of
15 North-Central Alabama and the Girl Scouts of Southern Alabama
